Season of Wonder: Escape the Ordinary

Ann Patchett Interviewed by Maureen Corrigan

Best-selling author Ann Patchett is the keynote speaker for the 10th anniversary season of Frederick Reads. Named one of the 100 Most Influential People in the World by *TIME* in 2012, Patchett will be interviewed by NPR's Maureen Corrigan on-stage.

Ann Patchett is a celebrated author, a devoted reader and a champion of literary culture. She has written eight books and is a frequent contributor to many publications, including *The New York Times, Atlantic Monthly* and *The Wall Street Journal*. She has served on the board of the Nashville Public Library Foundation, and in 2011, when the last of Nashville's bookstores had been shuttered, Patchett declared "I have no interest in living in a city without a bookstore." And so, in November of that year she opened Parnassus Books, a new refuge for the written word.

Patchett published her first story in *The Paris Review* while still a student at Sarah Lawrence College. *Bel Canto*, her fourth novel, was published in 2001 and was awarded the Orange Prize and the PEN/Faulkner Award. The world-renowned Lyric Opera Company of Chicago has commissioned a production based on that novel that will premiere in 2015. Her most recent novel *State of Wonder* was published in 2011. *The Washington Post* called that book "the smartest, most exciting novel of the summer" and *Library Journal* described it as "superbly rendered." Patchett is also the author of three works of nonfiction including *Truth & Beauty*, which won the Heartland Prize for Nonfiction and *This is the Story of a Happy Marriage* which NPR called "terrific and wide-ranging."

Maureen Corrigan

NPR's Fresh Air Book Critic

For more than 20 years, Maureen Corrigan has been the book critic for NPR's Fresh Air, reviewing a portion of the 200 plus books she receives each week for consideration. Along with NPR, Corrigan is a columnist for *The Washington Post* and the critic-in-residence at Georgetown University. In the past, she has written reviews for *The New York Times, The Boston Globe,* and *The Nation*, among others. She is an associate editor and contributor to *Mystery and Suspense Writers* and the winner of the 1999 Edgar Award for Criticism. In 2012, she served as a juror for the Pulitzer Prize in Fiction.

Corrigan, however, does not just critique books; she is also the author of two books of her own. Her titles include *Leave me Alone I'm Reading* and *So We Read On: How the Great Gatsby Came to Be and Why It Endures*, which was named one of the ten best books of the year by *Library Journal*.

It was Corrigan's father, an avid reader, who first inspired her passion for reading. However, it wasn't until graduate school, at the University of Pennsylvania, that she was first introduced to the possibility of writing about books. This occurred when a friend invited her to write a review for the *Village Voice*.

Considered one of America's most trusted and beloved book critics, Corrigan now lives in Washington, D.C. with her husband and daughter.

History Comes Alive at Frederick County Public Libraries

An African-American Research and Preservation Symposium Project

Did you know that local burial grounds such as the Middletown Cemetery are a rich source of information when researching your family history? Recently, the Carrollton Manor Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) published *The Forgotten: The Middletown African Methodist Episcopal Cemetery,* which holds important source material on individuals located in this largely undocumented burial ground. The library invites you to explore your roots during a special history symposium co-sponsored by the Historical Society of Frederick County in partnership with the C. Burr Artz Maryland Room, which is a rich source of genealogical information.

Speakers include Dr. Emilie Amt, the chair of the Hood College history department who will address African American history in Western Maryland; and Dr. Richard Smith of McDaniel College with advice on using cemetery data and record collecting in your own ancestral research.

You're invited to explore not only *The Forgotten*, which is available for use in the Maryland Room, but also the Linton-Holdcraft Obituary Collection, "Colored" Deaths, as Recorded in Articles, Obituaries, and Funeral Notices by John E. Keller, II

and Death and Burial Notices of African Americans, Frederick County, Maryland by David H. Wallace.

Much of the Carrollton Manor DAR research was conducted in the library's very own Maryland Room, which is a dedicated history section on the 2nd floor of C. Burr Artz Public Library.
